Dear Parents,

We are now into our second semester at Newtown High School. It has been an eventful year, including outstanding work by our students in the classroom and within the school community. In an effort to continue to improve our practice, we have solicited feedback from parents during breakfast meetings, as well as receiving input from our students through surveys given during advisory periods.

A survey regarding our PLC days, for example, yielded positive information about our students' use of their time for study and completion of assignments. In fact, 91% of our student-respondents liked the freedom they have to prioritize their time, and 82% would like to see this time increased to once a month. As students will be moving on to college and future careers, the ability to set goals, use their time appropriately, and accomplish tasks on their own will be critically important.




We are equally committed to improving our professional practices to ensure all students have an equitable educational experience. World Languages Beyond the Classroom Day

Newtown High School's World Language Department will be hosting "World Languages Beyond the Classroom" Day. Science Department News

UConn's Natural Resources Conservation Academy

On January 11, Dr. Laura Cisneros of UConn presented to the NHS science department about The Natural Resources Conservation Academy (NRCA). UConn's NRCA is an exciting program that engages high school students (grades 9 to 11) in natural resource conservation in their local community that is meaningful for the student, complementary to existing science curriculum, and beneficial to our communities and environment.




First, students attend a week-long field experience at UConn in July. Afterwards, each student conducts a conservation project under the mentorship of a local conservation leader. Projects culminate in March, when students present their work at the Connecticut Conference on Natural Resources and graduate as "Connecticut Conservation Ambassadors." NRCA is currently working with another great group of students on a diversity of conservation projects throughout the state. To date, NRCA has worked with 92 students and 51 community partners on 74 conservation projects. It has been an enriching experience for both students, their partners, and their communities.

Dr. Cisneros is making school visits and speaking with students throughout CT about the NRCA to recruit for the 2016 program, and this year they will be inviting teachers with students attending the program to participate in one of the field experience days as well.

Torque Equilibrium



Students in Mrs. Torrance's Physics class used helium balloons, meter sticks, weights, and fulcrums to establish an equilibrium between upward and downward torques in their physics class.

AMERICAN STUDIES COURSE

In 2016-2017, the English and Social Studies departments will collaborate to offer our junior students a unique interdisciplinary opportunity. The American Studies course, a co-taught 2-period block, offers students the chance to explore how American literature and American history together reveal the complex patterns of what characterizes our country. The inquirydriven curriculum will engage students in



examining how literature, the arts and material culture illuminate the political, economic, and social patterns of the past and their imprint on the present.

The American Studies curriculum is designed not only to integrate the two disciplines of literature and history, but also to integrate study of the past with the present-day lives of the student. Students interested in the course should speak with their English and/or Social Studies teachers as they move through the course selection process.

recommendations, transcripts, SAT/ACT scores.

Scholarship Tips for Seniors

- Scholarships are for those seniors who are planning on continuing their education at either a 4-year or 2-year college, or technical school.
- Each scholarship is different and reading for details is important. Be mindful of deadlines. There are rarely extensions or excuses accepted if an application is late. You do not have to wait until the due date to submit or mail a scholarship application. Waiting until the due date may be problematic if you are sick, or there is a weather-related event.
- Transcript and report card requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance through Mrs. Latowicki or a School Counseling secretary. Again, do not wait until the last minute to request these documents.
- There are scholarships based on interests, religion, ethnicity, a disability, community service, GPA's, majors, etc.
- Check for scholarships through your parent's and/or grandparent's employers or organizations they are involved with.

- Check the website of the school you plan on attending since many schools offer scholarships which go unanswered since many students are unaware that scholarships are being offered.
- Scholarships may reduce your financial aid. If this causes a problem, a call to the financial aid office, at the school you are attending, explaining your situation, may be helpful.
- Never fill out an application in pencil.
- Most applications may be downloaded from <u>Naviance</u> unless otherwise noted. Paper applications are available in the Career Center as specified. Some applications are through specific websites, also noted in <u>Naviance</u>.
- Check other scholarship websites listed on your <u>Naviance</u> home page, i.e. Cappex, Sallie Mae, CollegeWeekLive, Fast Web, Unigo, etc.
- PLEASE remember to write thank you note/s to the local and regional organizations that awarded the scholarship. This is a very important step in the scholarship process.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH STANDARDS

The Basics of School Lunch According to Federal Standards—Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act

2015

Background

In January 2012, the final updated standards for school meals, the National School Lunch Standards (NSLP) were set forth. Standards, build upon recommendations from the Institute of Medicine:

- Ensure students are offered both fruits and vegetables every day of the week
- Increase offerings of whole grain-rich foods
- Offer only fat-free or low-fat milk
- Limit calories based on the age of children being served to ensure proper portion size
- Increase the focus on reducing the amounts of saturated fat, trans fats, added sugars, and sodium.

The NSLP Transformation—Then and Now

1946: Type A meal

- Menu consisted of items from the four main food groups (meats, fruits/vegetables, grains and milk)
- Students must take all the meal components
- Resulted in a large amount of food waste
- 1977: Meals based on age groups with different serving sizes
 - Offer vs. serve, full meal is offered but students can decline parts they don't want
- 1995: Nutrient Standard Planning
 - More emphasis on meeting specific nutrient targets
 - Menus planned to meet specific age-based nutrient targets with minimum calorie requirements
 - Unintended consequences:
 - Variety of products fortified with nutrients not normally seen in those foods
 - Example: pastries fortified with nutrients normally found in fruits and vegetables (super donut)
 - Rise in foods added to menus to increase calories and lower overall fat content that were high in sugar

Today: Component-based Standard Planning

- In 2010, the *Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act* became law with new requirements replacing nutrient focused menus with menus using the five food components: meat/meat alternates, grains, fruits, vegetables and milk. Depending on the grade, must offer a certain amount with every reimbursable meal
- Resemble early years, and also address the age-based nutrition targets by including specific foods that are high in vitamins and minerals necessary for child development.

Minimum Daily Requirements Grades k-5, k-8 and 6-8 Must Offer

Students Must Take At Least 3 Components For a Reimbursable Meal One Must Be a Fruit or Vegetable

- 1 oz meat,
- 1 oz equivalent grain,
- ¾ cup vegetable
- ♦ ½ cup fruit
- 8 oz or 1 cup milk

Grades 9-12 Must Offer

- 2 oz meat
- 2 oz equivalent grain
- 1 cup vegetable
- 1 cup fruit
- 8 oz or 1 cup milk

Weekly Average Nutrient Requirements

- Calories * Sodium * Saturated Fat
- ** Zero grams trans fat daily
- **Weekly requirements higher than daily
